“Celebrate Easter!”

After those 40 days, we will finally make it to resurrection Sunday. After all the time, prayer, fasting, etc. we will experience Easter once again. However, I want to encourage you to keep the celebration going.

Easter is not a one-day event on the Christian calendar. Many of you who are liturgically savvy will know that we are now in the great season of Easter (or Eastertide).

This is a 50-day season that ends when Pentecost Sunday comes! In many Protestant churches, we are guilty of “moving on” to something else after Easter Sunday while completely forgetting that the Christian calendar calls us to be in this



season for a while and I, for one, love that.

I am going to try to intentionally be more present and aware of the resurrection this year. Perhaps I'll listen to the songs and hymns that are about the resurrection. Perhaps I'll read the resurrection passages in the gospels more than I usually do. Perhaps I'll choose to be more conscious of what it means to be a disciple of Jesus Christ in light of the resurrection.

Church, the tomb is empty and we can declare that Christ is Risen! He is Risen indeed! Hallelujah!

**Update from The Way Forward (TWF)
Committee
As of: 3/12/2023**

The Way Forward (TWF) Committee has been busy during February and March, but remember, we are not disaffiliating—we are in the process of discerning whether or not to disaffiliate. Our letter of intent to discern our position about disaffiliation was sent to the District Superintendent (DS) on 2/19, dates for the discernment process were established and Resolutions to eliminate the Pen-Del Conference cost of 50% of our church assets were submitted in the event we vote to disaffiliate. By the time you read this we will have already viewed the “Stay or Go” Video, and met with the DS for meeting #1 (of three) where he presented his view of what disaffiliation means and answered questions from our congregation.

As we progress with our discernment process, we will move into the four-week book study—*Living Faithfully: Human Sexuality and The United Methodist Church*. The book study will be held each Wednesday on 3/29, 4/5, 4/12, 4/19. You may attend at either at 10 am or 6:30 pm—you pick the time. The same presentation will be given. On Wednesday, April 26, 2023 the DS will hold meeting #2 to answer any questions we have about the book study or disaffiliation.

Then Saturday, May 20, 2023 the DS will hold a Church Conference at our church to vote on disaffiliation. It requires 2/3 or more of our members present at that meeting to vote to disaffiliate (no proxies, no absentee votes). Our actual disaffiliation can only be approved by the Pen-Del Annual Conference to be held June 8-12, 2023. If the 2/3 threshold is not reached on May 20th the

process stops immediately and SMBTS remains a United Methodist Church. If we do vote to disaffiliate, the Annual Conference must approve our disaffiliation. During the next six months we would complete the paperwork and decide if we wish to remain independent or join another Methodist denomination. May the Lord be with us as we love one another and find our Way Forward.

Ponderings From Chris King:

Pastor Bruce Miller visited Chris King recently and brought back this inspirational message from him:

“Both of my wrists remain scabbed and swollen, this a full week since I returned from a four-day stay in a nearby hospital. Four days cuffed and shackled. While I slept, while I ate, and even while using the bathroom. ‘A prisoner suffering in iron chains’ (Psalms 107:10), that was me. The pain from the metal cuffs digging into the flesh of my wrists is still fresh in my mind.

Turns out there was no heart trouble. I am grateful. Now that I am back to the monotonous routine of prison life, I reflect on some of the pleasantries experienced on my recent trip.

Country meatloaf. I never thought that hospital food could taste so good.

A comfortable bed

The attentive care from the generous nurses. It can be hard to remember what it is like to receive another person’s care and compassion. That just doesn’t happen in

prison. They called me by name and not by a Department of Corrections I.D. number.

It seems to me that, sometime during these past ten years, my humanity seeped away. For four days I was human again, the experience giving me a new, deep-seeded appreciation for simple things. A hot meal, a soft mattress, a gentle touch, a few days away from the confines of this cell.

1st Thessalonians 5:18 reminds me to give thanks in all circumstances and so I am full of gratitude. Things that could so easily be taken for granted now seem so important. I will not soon forget that country meatloaf!

Thought for the day: I will take time to appreciate life's simple blessings.

Prayer: Dear Lord, help me to show my gratitude for all of life's little gifts.

My prayer focus: Hospital staffs."

Chris has been a long-time faithful member of St. Matthews and daily demonstrates his love for the Lord, against odds that most of us can't even fathom. God bless Chris as an example for the rest of us.

MONDAY MORNING BIBLE STUDY

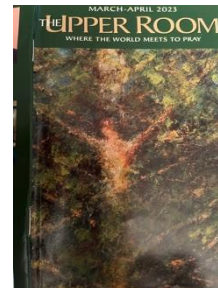
The Monday Morning Bible Study will be starting a new 7-week study on the Book of

Our African Adventure From Merle and Evelyn Dimeler

Genesis 7 describes God's hand in making sure that animals are with us on earth. "The LORD then said to Noah, "Go into the ark, you and your whole family, because I have found you righteous in this generation. [2](#)Take with you seven pairs of every kind of clean animal, a male and its mate, and one pair of every kind of unclean animal, a male and its mate, [3](#)and also seven pairs of every kind of bird, male and female, to keep their various kinds alive throughout the earth. [4](#)Seven days from now I will send rain on the earth for forty days and forty nights, and I will wipe from the face of the earth every living creature I have made." And Noah did all that the LORD commanded him."

So, thanks to God and Noah, there are animals the world over – and Merle and Evelyn recently spent time with some of them in South Africa.

On December 22nd we flew from Atlanta to Johannesburg, South Africa – a sixteen-hour flight, to spend Christmas with our granddaughter, Stephanie, and her family in Pretoria. Their house is one of four homes in a gated compound surrounded by an eight-foot wall topped with wire. Stephanie's husband, Chris, works at the U.S. Embassy. In fact, while we were there, he took us on a tour of the embassy.

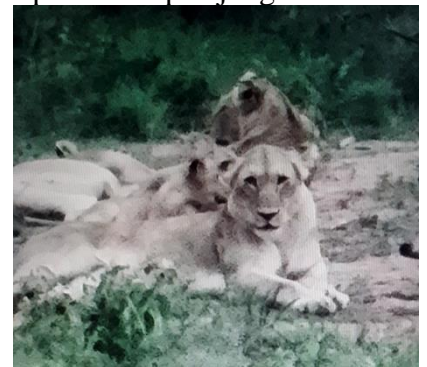
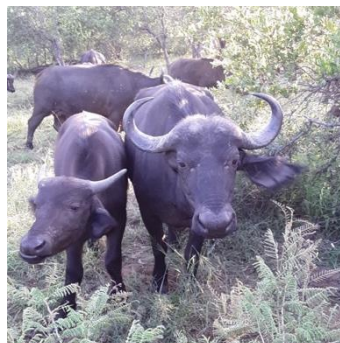


Our first adventure was a trip to the largest shopping mall in South Africa. Because of car thieves, many black men watch cars for tips. They direct you in and out of parking spaces. In the supermarkets eggs and milk are not refrigerated and you can buy wild animal meat. (You can also order wild animal meat in restaurants.)

Our next adventure was a visit to Kruger National Park. Kruger Park is on several acres of fenced in wild land guarded by armed guards. We stayed at a lodge called Mokala which means "place of rest." It had the biggest bed I ever saw. Our room had a large sliding door

which we kept closed because there were thieving monkeys around.

Shortly after we settled in, our guides took us on our first safari. We loaded up into an open jungle cruiser truck. The first animals we saw were rhinos. We were surprised how close we were able to get to the animals. And at each stop we had plenty of time to take pictures. And we did! We had two guides. One sat on a small jump seat attached to the front of our truck. When we came in contact with animals, he would get into the truck. One day when the sun was going down, we suddenly left the trail and went into the bush where we came upon a pride of lions (a pride is a family group). We stayed there for 25 minutes until one of our children woke from a nap and brought a reaction from the lions, and from



made a noise. This our guides who said

we had to get out of there. On our way back to our lodge, it was dark and the guides were shining flashlights into the trees watching for jaguars.

Our second day in Kruger Park started at 5 am. We saw hippos, crocks, herds of antelope and gnus. Then we went back to the lodge for lunch. After lunch, we went into the bush where we found a large herd of cape buffalo. And we were right in the middle of the herd!

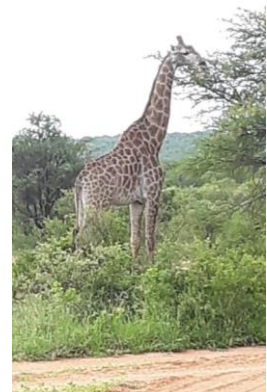
The guides tried so hard to find elephants. In fact, we spend most of that afternoon looking and, suddenly, we came around a stand of trees and there they were!! A large family of elephants! We came upon them so suddenly that the guide didn't have time to get out of the jump seat and one of the elephants came right up and sniffed him!! We got many pictures.



The next morning our granddaughter, her husband and myself (Merle) went out to find Wild African Dogs. They are almost extinct and no one had seen one lately but we did! And we had another surprise – we thought our adventure was over and as we were loaded up and heading to where our car was parked, we crossed a stream, went up a hill and there stood a large bull elephant. A wonderful end to a perfect visit.



Our next adventure was called Horseback Africa. Following a long ride on a dirt road, we wondered what we were getting ourselves into. But when we finally arrived it was a beautiful place. We were greeted with a warm beverage and then it was off to the stables. The people who run the resort are Scottish so, in true British tradition, we were offered a drink – after mounting our horses. I (Merle) opted for a ginger ale. Chris and Evelyn rode in an open buggy. Once again, during our ride we saw many animals. We came back from our ride at noon and had lunch and relaxed. The lady who runs the resort is an artist and her paintings of wild animals and horses were everywhere.



After lunch we walked with a young lady who showed us all the animals they were caring for. At one point she called out and three lion cubs came bounding over from nowhere. They knocked her and our great grandson, Charley, both down. Charley said the lion cubs thought he was McDonalds!

We had a very enjoyable time with family and lots of animals in South Africa! Merle and Evelyn
